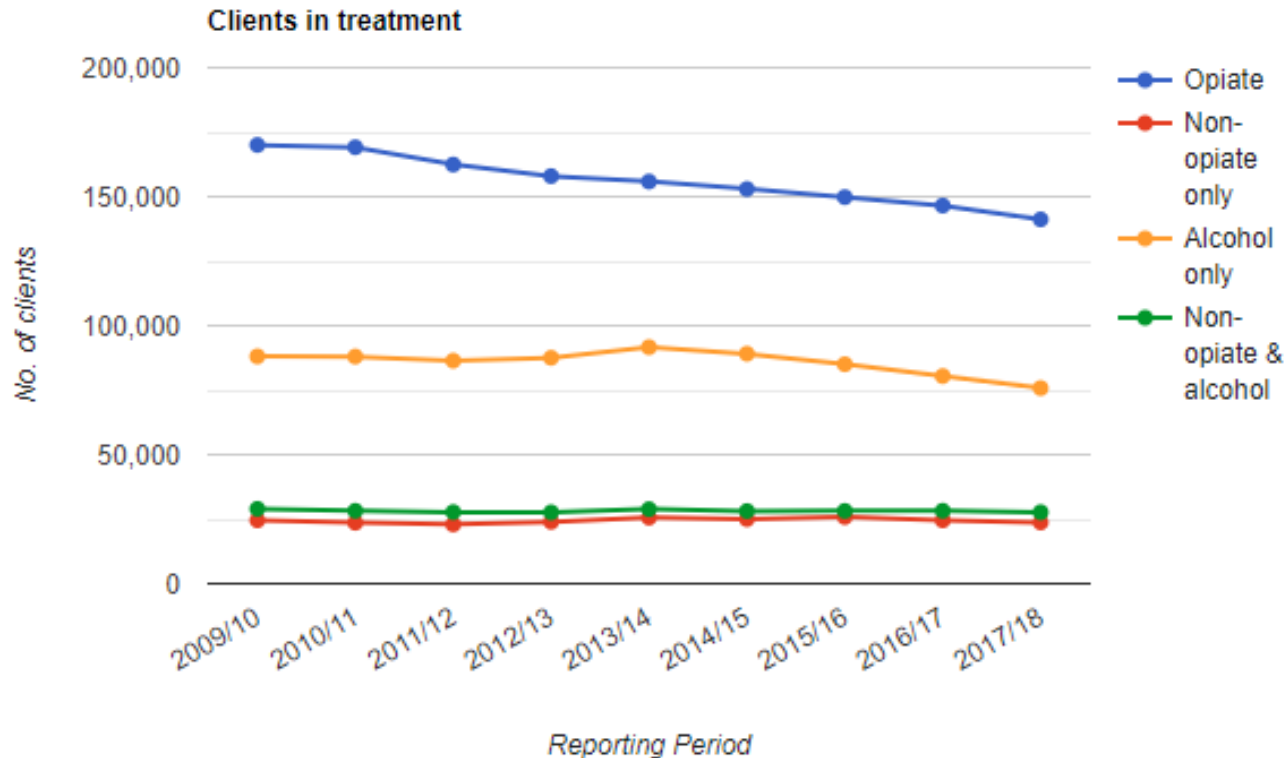

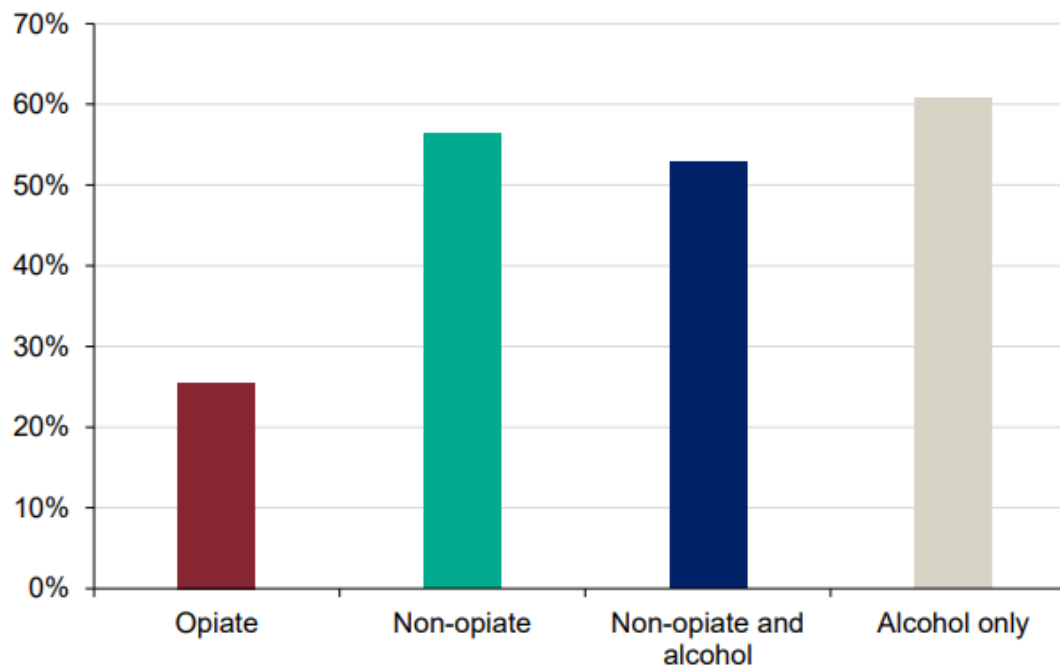
# National Drug & Alcohol Treatment Population

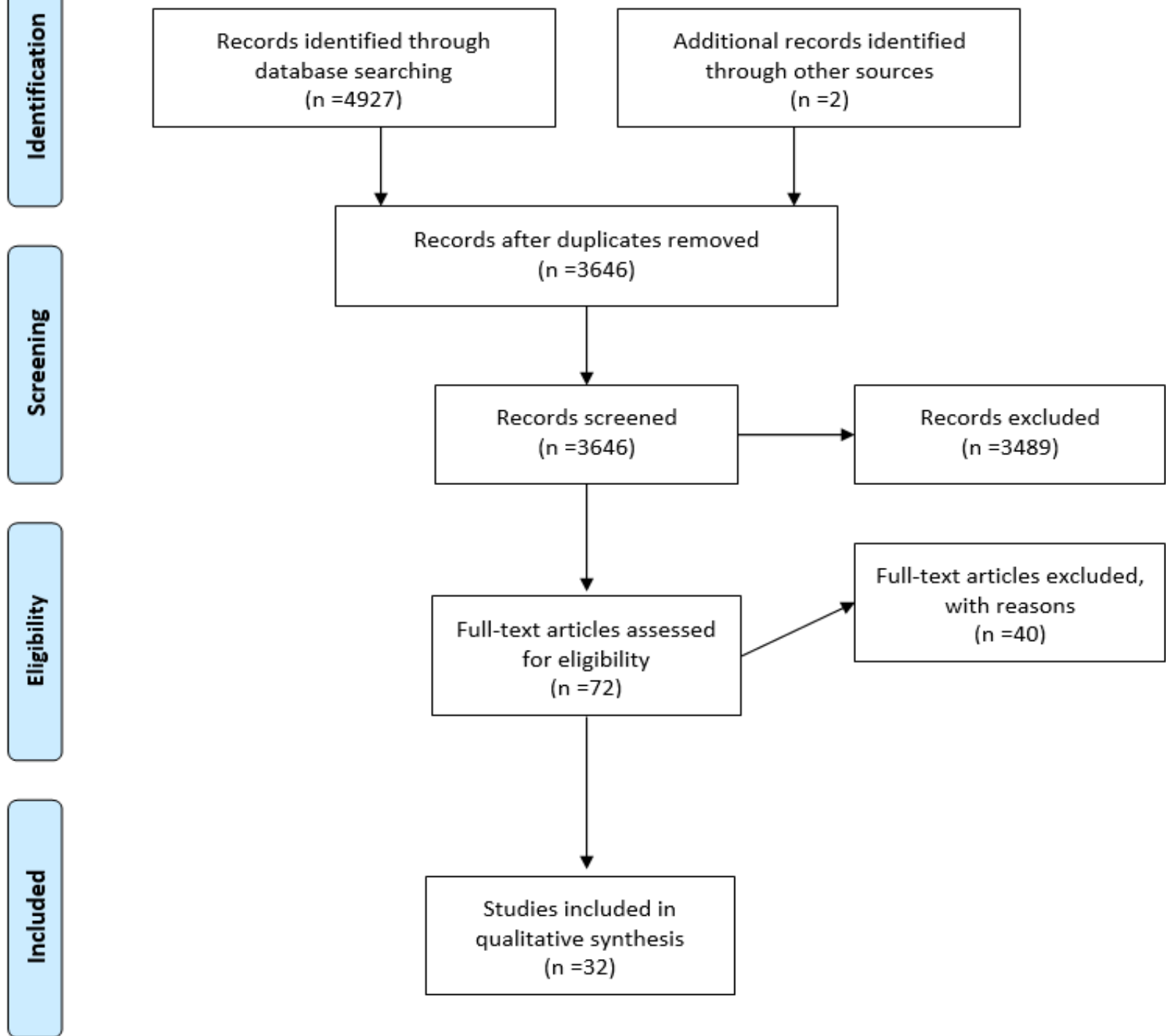
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# Aims

- **Aims:**
  - Identify facilitators and barriers to recovery within OST
  - Familiarisation with qualitative literature on OST
  - Identify possible targets for intervention development
- **Inclusion criteria:**
  - Any country (English language papers only)
  - Adults (18+)
  - Service users and stakeholder views
  - Peer reviewed articles published in last 20 years



# Characteristics of Included Studies (n=32)

- UK (10)
- USA (8)
- Ireland (5)
- Canada (3)
- Australia (2)
- Norway (2)
- Italy (1)
- Sweden (1)



Service users (24 studies): n=680

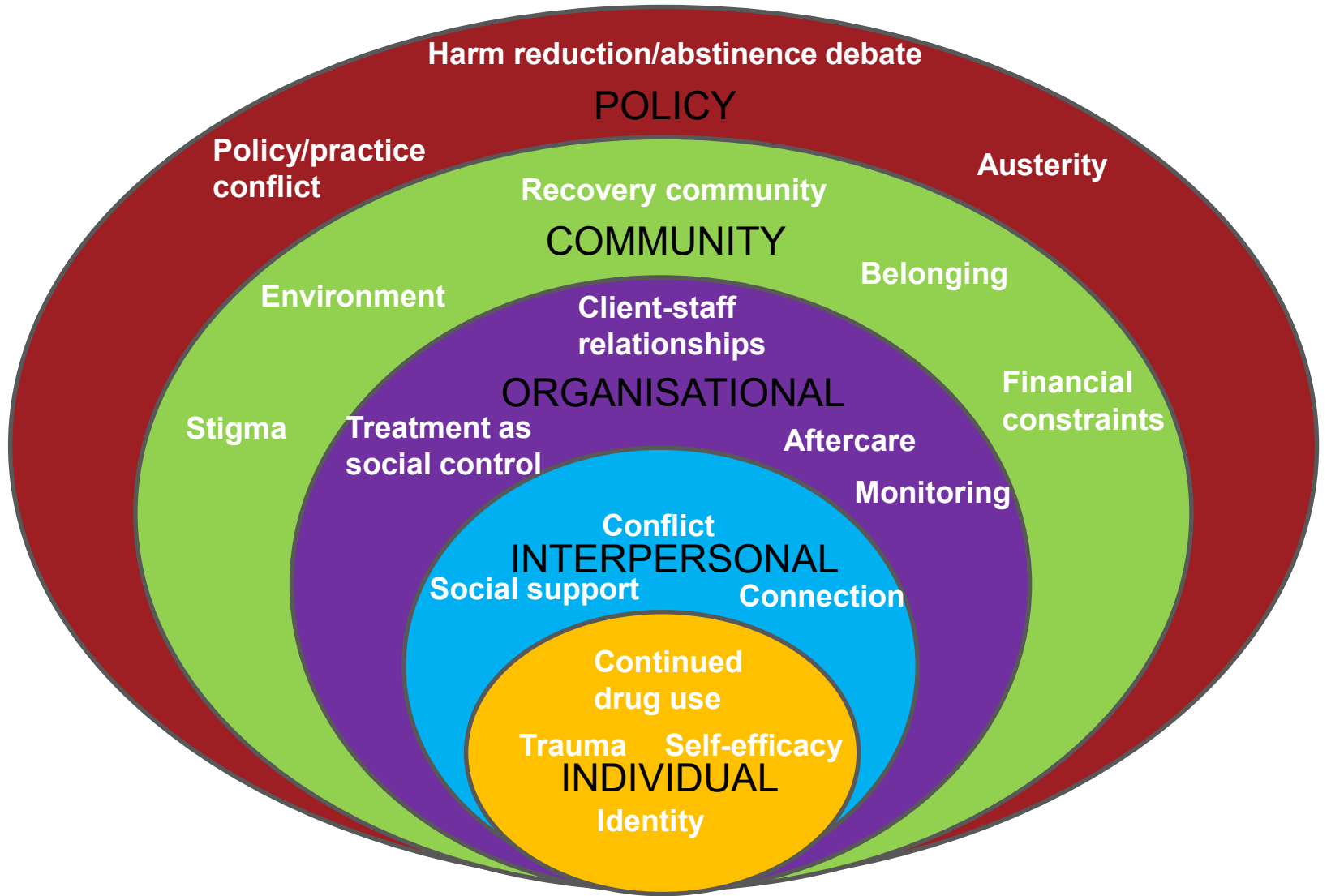
Stakeholders (3 studies): n=63

Both (5 studies): n=263

# Trauma

[describing experience of children's home] "Life there was horrible, horrible, horrible, horrible, some terrible things, Oh I don't even want to talk about them..." (Moran et al, 2018).

"You know, I'm busy. My mother's in the hospital, you know. I'm dealing with the death of a brother and my son was just murdered. I got a lot going on in my life right now." (Lindsey-Smith & Rosen, 2009).

"I lost two children in 9 days. My son, he hung himself in prison, three days left in his sentence. My daughter committed suicide 9 days later. She went out, bought Xanax (alprazolam), and took the whole lot and she took about nine bags of heroin as well and just threw herself off the bridge. Afterwards, I tried to kill myself." (Moran et al, 2018).

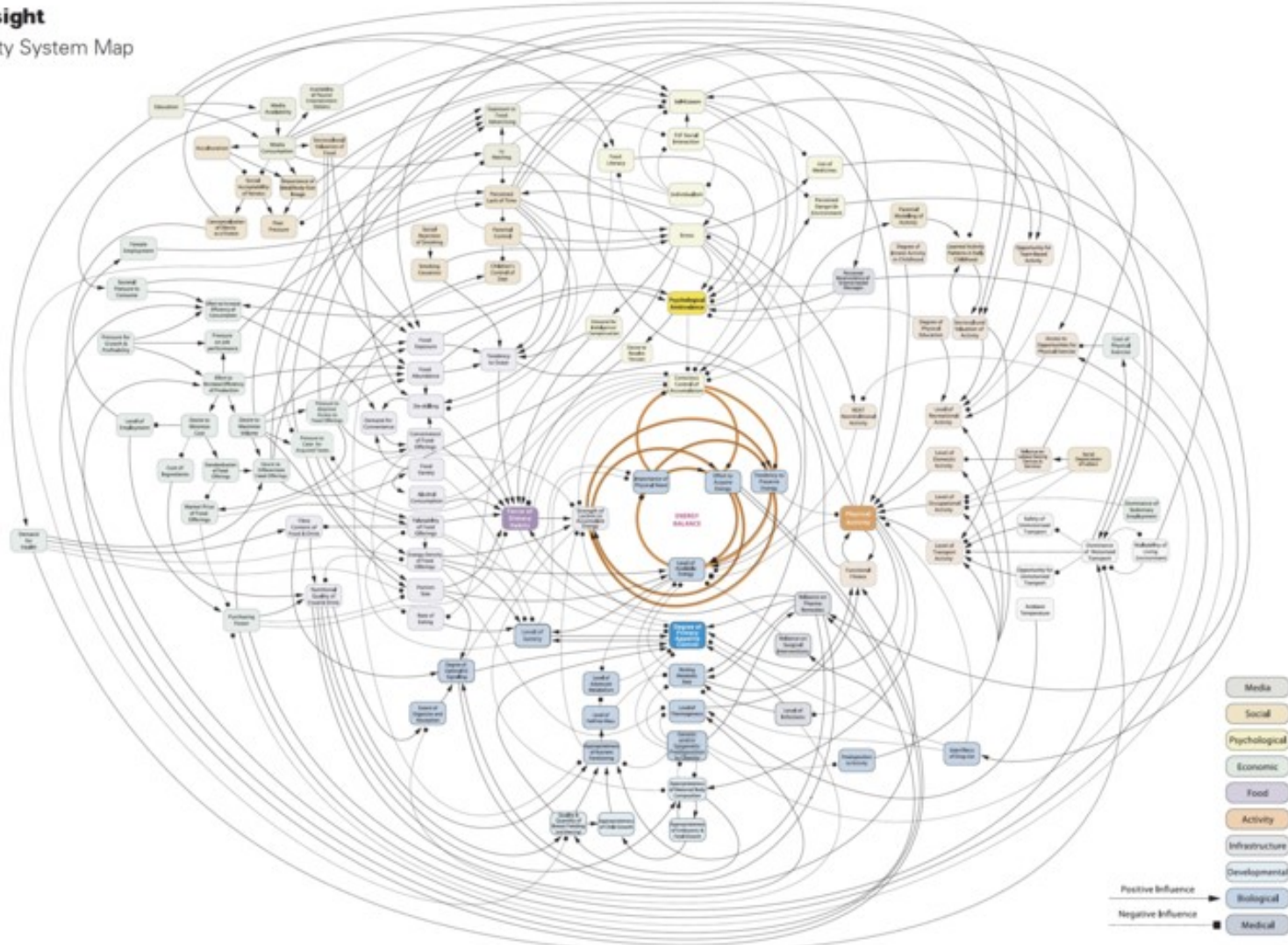


## **Influences of family and friends (positive and negative):**

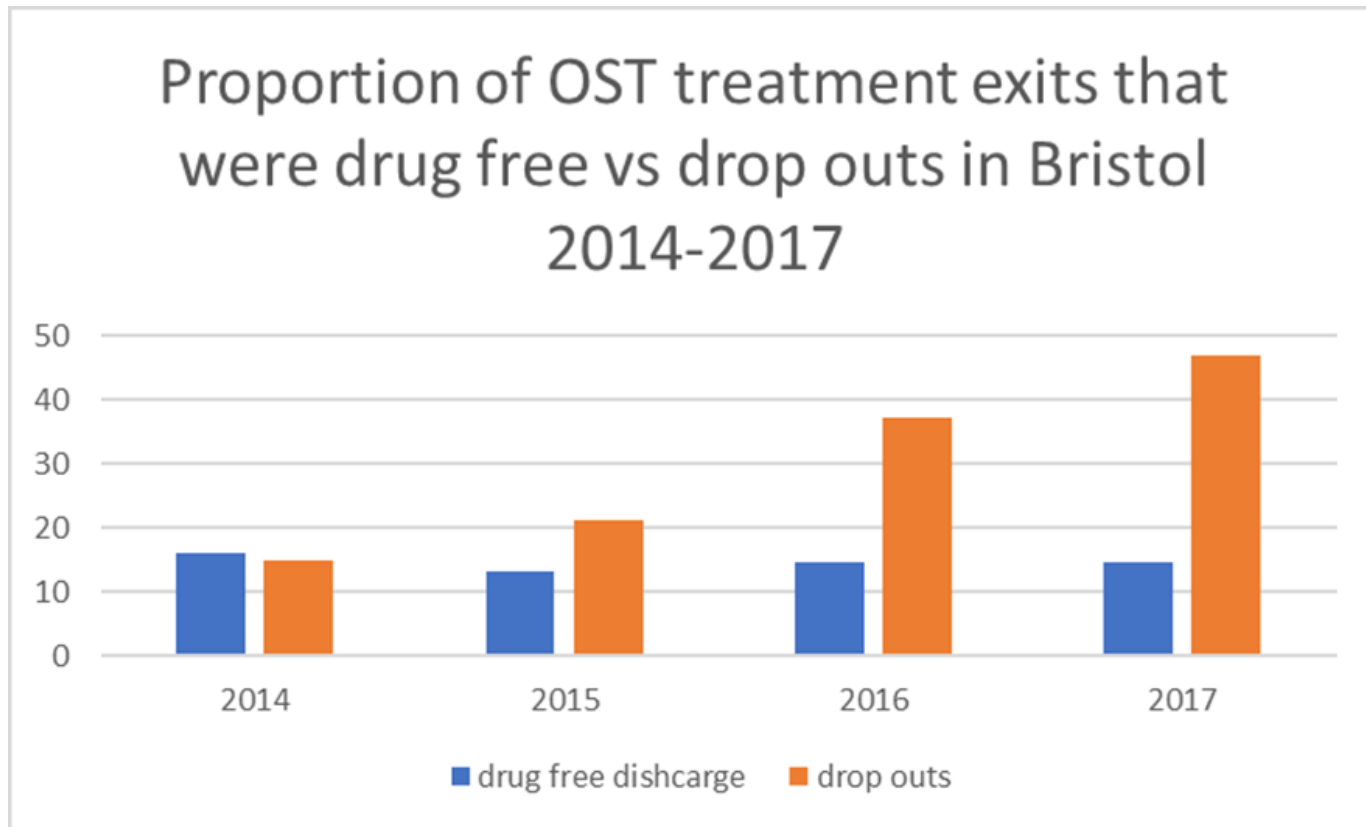


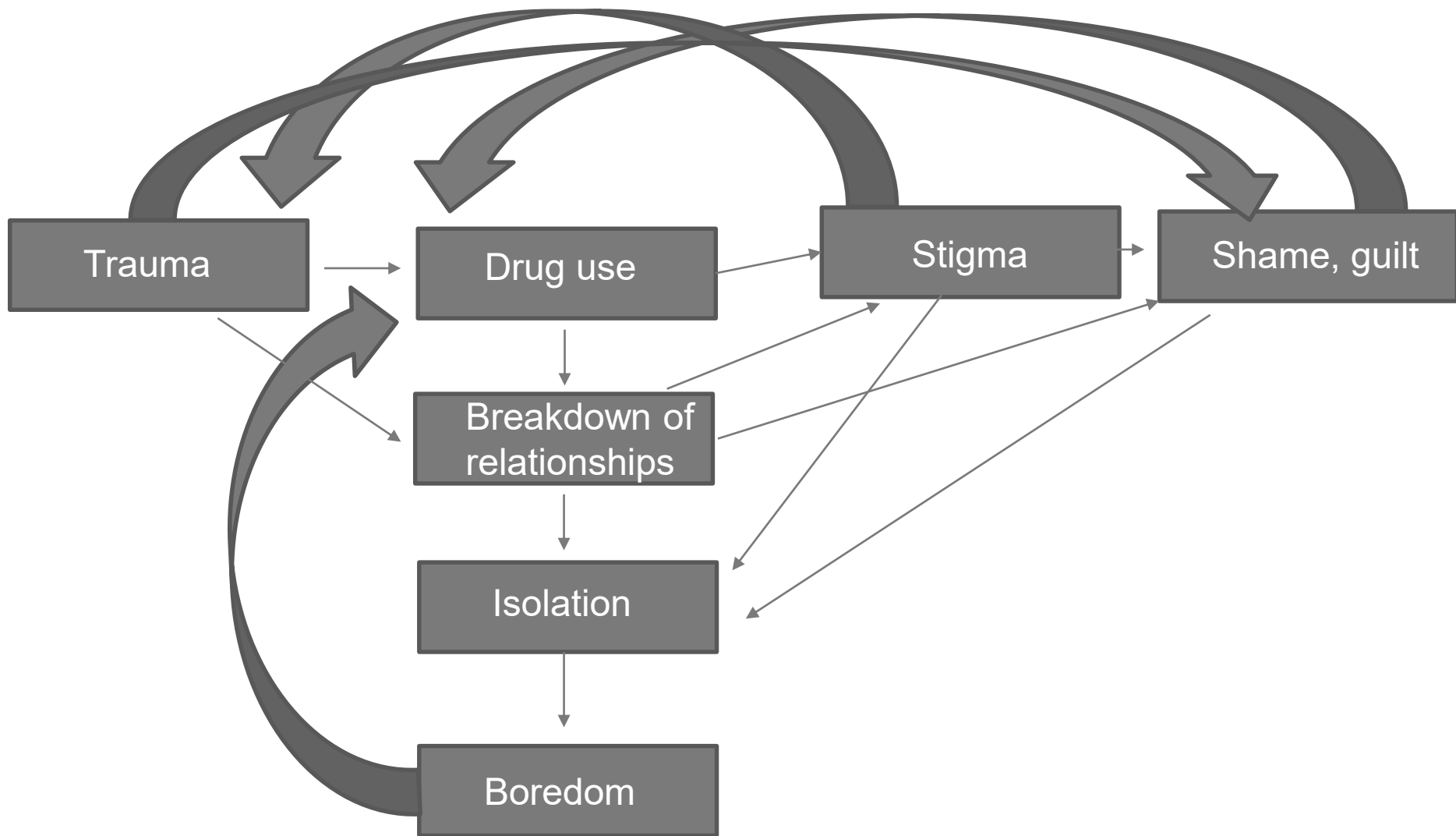

# Intrapersonal

## Self-Efficacy & Locus of Control



“Perhaps more significantly, participants framed their recovery in avoidance language (staying away from drugs, walking away from temptation, hiding from trouble) as opposed to engagement language (e.g., finding a job, maintaining a healthy lifestyle)” (Redden, Tracy, & Shafer, 2013)
